

Crackle Weave and More Susan Wilson

March 9-10, 2013 9 am to 4 pm

'Crackle Weave is a surprisingly versatile weave with exciting design potential on just 4 shafts. This workshop covers the essentials of drafting and designing in the classic crackle weave, with consideration of design elements of proportion, color, value and texture. In addition, we will explore the many variations possible by treadling crackle in the manner of other weaves, e.g. summer and winter, and by using special treadlings, e.g. polychrome. Your sample will include at least twelve distinctly different fabrics, all on crackle weave threading.'

I'll share with you a quest for the perfect fleece and how I've put my philosophy to work judging fleeces from the next-to-skin softness of the Merino fiber to the strong durability of the Karakul rug wool.

NEW TO OUR LIBRARY!!!

INTERLACED

In recent years, several guilds have marked anniversaries with publications that honor their histories and showcase the talents of their members. This past fall, *Interlaced*, one of the most recent additions to this genre, was published by the Weavers Guild of Boston (WGB) to mark its 90th birthday.

Interlaced is a gorgeous book that offers both weaving expertise and artistic inspiration. Its 90 (actually, 100+) pieces originate from plain weave drafts through drafts requiring looms with 16+ shafts and/or computerization. The photography is professional in quality; each page includes a photo of the piece, the draft, and the artist's statement. As a reference tool, Interlaced is useful: the "Table of Contents" organizes weave structures by chapters; the "Bibliography" includes significant weaving titles and articles; and the "Index" facilitates location of a weaver, technique, or structure within the book. Whatever a weaver's level, *Interlaced* is an asset to one's personal library – and with thanks to Kristi Chapman, our librarian, it is now part of the WGK library and available for check-out. While the weavings amaze and inspire, the section entitled, "An Historical Overview: Organization and Education", helps readers learn about our country's oldest guild and appreciate WGB's pride in its past and present. For example, upon joining WGB, each member is given a number which marks his/hers unique place in the guild's membership. These numbers may be found after the name of each weaver whose work appears in the book. To encourage its members' continuing education, WGB has a four-level ratings program to challenge members, and then recognize their achievements.

While the "Acknowledgements" and "Preface" outline the many tasks, responsibilities, skills, and time (two years), necessary to complete this enormous project, they also give readers – and other guilds considering such a project – a glimpse of its enormity. While the creation of *Interlaced* required a concerted team effort, almost every submission includes a dedication in which the weaver recognizes that his/her skills also grew from team effort. The dedications extend appreciation to friends, teachers, and fellow guild members for the gifts of encouragement and mentorship, the human interlacement that gives meaning to the subtitle of this book: 90 Years of Friendship and Education.

Spinning Wool I- 195: with Emily Wolscheide and Helen Duffy March 9-10 Sat-Sun 9:00 am-5:00 pm Tuition: \$180 Materials: \$25

Join us for a two day venture into the art of turning wool into yarn! Discover spinning wheel basics, begin to train your hands, feet, and head in the age old craft of spinning. You will learn to treadle with control and carefully draft fibers to produce a consistent yarn. We discuss types of wool, breeds of sheep, and basic fiber preparation.

Once you are spinning a consistent single yarn, learn to ply, why we ply, and discuss what applications are best suited to plied yarns. Learn to wind off your completed skein and finish yarn by washing and fulling. Bring your own spinning wheel if it is in working order. Some wheels will be available. Fiber will be provided. *Product: yarn. Enrollment: 4 to 8 Minimum age: 12*

Spinning Wool II- 196: with Emily Wolscheide April 13 Sat 9:00 am-5:00 pm Tuition: \$90 Materials: \$10

This class is designed to take the beginning spinner beyond simple two ply yarn. We will focus on learning to spin to gauge, measure gauge, spin a yarn for a specific use. Plying will be a major focus and we will learn Navajo plying, multiple-plying making 2, 3, and 4-ply yarns. We will also investigate spinning fibers other than wool, blending of different fibers, and making novelty yarns. Although wheels will be available, it would be preferable for your learning experience if you can bring the wheel you are used to using. Must be able to spin a consistent diameter yarn. Students should bring 1-2 bobbins of singles spun yarn. Product: yarn. Enrollment: 4 to 6 Minimum age: 12

Felting I - 197a: with Dawn Edwards March 2 Sat 9:00 am - 5:00 pm Tuition: \$95 Materials: \$25

Transform colorful merino wool roving into a unique and beautiful felt journal cover (journal included in materials fee). We will make our creations using our hands, imagination, and a little soap and water in a magical process called wet-felting which makes a strong, durable felt. This class is a great introduction to felt-making and the techniques learned can be incorporated into many felt-making projects.

Materials provided: merino wool roving, journal, fiber embellishments, soap, bubble wrap, plastic resist material, and written instructions. Please bring two old towels, wear comfortable clothes that you don't mind getting a bit wet or bring along a waterproof apron. *Enrollment: 4-10 Minimum Age: 12*

Felted Shepherd's Rugs - 197b: with Letty Klein March 23 Sat 9:00 am - 5:00 pm Tuition: \$95 Materials: \$15 (wool additional cost or bring own)

This day-long workshop is for the fiber artist with a closet full of fiber or the shepherd wishing to make something from their wool sheep. Students will learn how to braid roving, felt the braids, and sew the braids into a beautiful, functional rug. In this class students will complete a simple chair pad using minimal equipment. We will braid in the morning, instructor will take the braids to a laundry over lunch, and the afternoon will be spent sewing. The techniques learned can be used to create their own beautiful rugs at home. Enrollment: 4-12 Minimum Age: 12
